Our School Wide Expectations

Importance of Whole School Language & Expected Behaviour

At Steffie Woima we have a school-wide approach for consistently teaching expectations to our students. We use a learning and problem solving approach to support our students in solving problems that grise. Our expectations of how student interact at school is connected to the expected behaviours that are important when they are teenagers and adults. We believe that it is important to explictly teach our kids how to successfully regulate, problem solve, and resolve conflicts. These are life long skills.

Helping kids acknowledge and learn from their mistakes requires support from both school and home. Parents and staff at Steffie are partners in growing kids! By teaching kids to take personal accountability and owning their part in problems, we teach them how to deal with mistakes. We all make mistakes and experience regret for the choices we wish we could take back. It is important to learn to fix or grow from the mistakes we make. It is also important that we take what we've learned to help us deal with problems in the future. This helps us learn how to self-regulate and work through conflict.

Our school wide expectations were created based on an understanding that children need these specific skills to be successful in the future. Kids want to be kind and want to do we They can do this when the adults care about them, have heathy, consistent and clear boundaries and are explicitly taught how to work through their emotions and situations.






Hands, Feet, and other Objects to Yourself

we teach our students this because...

This keeps everyone safe!



Eventually with this modeling and teaching students learn to self-regulate. They slowly are more able to manage and respond to emotional experiences. When our emotions are controling us, we first feel and act, and ony then think. Learning strategies to regulate in difficult moments helps kids to feel better and supports their relationships.

When students have difficulties following the expectation of keeping hands, feet, and other objects to themselves, we talk the situation through, try to determine what is leading to the difficulty, and make a plan as to how to regulate the next time they are in a similar situation. We often practice the strategies as well

The more kids can recognize their emotions, triggers and what they can do in distressful situations, the more they will be able to regulate when in situations. As adults we need to be able to keep our hands, feet, and other objects to ourselves as it is against the law and chargeable as assult. Working with children around this expectation supports them as teens when social interactions become more complex and as adults in the world of work and home.





Kind, Clean, and Courteous Language

we teach our students this because...

This shows caring towards others!

Being kind and polite to others makes them feel comfortable and safe. We express our thoughts, feelings and connect with others through language. Using expected language develops a child's social and emotional skills, social awareness, selfregulation, relationship skills and self-awareness. These are all skills that help us build healthy relationships and friendships.

We teach our kids that expected language changes in different contexts. It is expected to yell when playing with friends but not is the classroom or at the dinner table. Knowing what is expected to say and when to say it is also an important life skill



Listen and Follow Directions

This shows responsibility and also keeps everyone safe!

When kids practice listening and following directions, it helps them learn that there are times when it is critical to follow an adults directions. If a vehicle is driving by and you tell them to stop, they need to be able to follow that direction. If a police officer asks you to stop, it is important that you can follow that direction. Learning how to follow the directions of the adult allows children to be at rest (which helps others around them feel safe), impacts their ability to complete tasks, learn new skills, and keep them feeling calm and secure as they know what comes next. We also teach children that they should not blindly follow older peers and adults but to follow the directions of an adult when it is a safe and reasonable request. Children who have a difficult time actively listening and following reasonable adult directions, often have a difficult time learning and can create disruption in the classroom that interupts other children's learning as well.

As children mature, the ability to follow directions keeps them safe in moments of distress. It also helps them with workplace relationships.







This month's meeting was highly informative as we had the pleasure of hearing from our district superintendent, personally. Jackie Swainson brought news from the school district and we discussed the three main priorities they hold for our schools. Academic excellence, Social/emotional well being and career connections. The district is hard at work developing many plans to create amazing opportunities for our students.
